This past month, we made a return visit to The Garden State (New Jersey, for any members outside of the US). Anyone not in or from the northeast might find this interesting/amusing - Debonair Music Hall in Teaneck, NJ is very close to New York. The venue is 5 miles from the George Washington Bridge. And if we talk about traveling distance from our home base (the Mantiture's Lair is located in Lynbrook, NY on Long Island, near JFK airport) it's a 25 mile drive. With no traffic or RAs (road assholes), it SHOULD be less than a half-hour jaunt. However, that is never EVER the case. It took me 2 1/2 hours to get from home to the venue! After the show, I texted with my good friend Gërgo, in Hungary. That same day, he took a day trip to Vienna. We had a really great, well-attended show at the fabulous Debonair Music Hall in October. Local radio celebrity Bob Konig of WFDU 89.1 FM radio introduced us and we were off and running. Authors friend Dan Falcon brought his camcorder and recorded the entire show from his seat. This month brings us back up to Hudson Falls, NY, to the historic Strand Theatre. We've been fortunate to play The Strand for several years now. The huge stage, awesome sound system and accommodating staff make this venue a true joy to bring Austicore to year after year. Our gracious host, Jonathan Newell, is the power behind the ongoing renovation of this glorious venue. He's been toiling tirelessly for years, working with donations and volunteers to restore the 140 year old theatre to its original

majestic state. We're happy to be invited back to test the stability of the chandeliers and see if we can use a wide variety of audio frequencies to peel the paint off the walls. Now, the highlight of our November Enewsletter is a story from our Greg Lake surrogate, Ron Ponella, about his newest upcoming addition to our Chapticore family:

## "A Scorpion is Born!"

Back in 1977, with the release of their Works Volume 1 double album and its use of a 70 piece orchestra on the recording and subsequent concert tour, ELP had embarked on one of the most ambitious musical sojourns in the history of modern music.

On side 4 of the album, there are two pieces of music; Aaron Copeland's "Fanfare for the Common Man" and an ELP original piece called "Pirates". With both of these masterworks, we are treated to cutting edge performances by the band and an incredible blending of musical perfection with the orchestra.

We are also introduced to some amazing new sounds from Keith's Yamaha GX-1 synthesizer and Greg Lake's custom Alembic Scorpion 8-


string bass guitar, which would come to be affectionately called his "Pirate Bass". The sound of Greg's Bass on these recordings and in the live performances (which I was lucky enough to have attended during this tour) was absolutely extraordinary.

Alembic, famous for their quality craftsmanship and attention to detail, as well as their unique patented



signature electronic circuitry, is a favorite among such notable Bass greats as Stanley Clarke and John Entwhistle, as well as Greg Lake.

Always intrigued by Greg's beautiful Scorpion bass and that signature "Alembic sound" and never being able to capture anything that resembles it or is quite like it, I explored having one custom created for myself. So.....earlier this year, I decided to contact the artesan crafters at Alembic and have my own Scorpion built.



Working with my dealer, Trevor Lindsey (an amazing, talented bass player, touring musician and famous session man, himself), he helped me design the bass to my specific details. Every aspect of the build is considered, including the woods selected and body contours, as well as things like adding an ornate Heart Omega carving at the tail end of the body and choices of

headstock design (I chose to go with a style similar to Greg's).

The current basses

that I use on stage are a Music Man StingRay and a Sterling, both are 5-string. So, I designed it as a 5-string. I like playing 5-string basses, I feel that the low B adds a dimension to so many of the ELP songs we play in our shows. I had



the neck specifications matched most closely to my StingRay (with green side LED's).

Greg's Scorpion had some unique neck inlays, which were handmade by co-owner Susan Wickersham herself. She graciously

worked with me, designing (2) custom inlays for my neck. A skull and crossbones (an homage to Greg and his Scorpion) and a Manticore (for obvious reasons).

Susan is a super nice lady who loved telling me about her time working with Greg Lake (he had 2 Scorpions built and several other Alembic basses and guitars) and how nice a man he was.. I was so thrilled

to hear about all of it. Alembic takes great pride in their craftsmanship and the entire process, start to finish, takes about a year or more per instrument.

I'm hoping to have it by the time we play our show at Prog on the Ranch in Florida, next year. I'll keep you updated.

If you happen to have a connection to the venue, even better!

Keep in mind, November is the month that Carl Palmer's Legacy Band is Carl is doing his ELP50 Welcome Back My returning to The States! Friends - The Return of Emerson, Lake & Palmer Tour, at which he'll be playing a good part of his set along with live concert footage of Keith and Greg flanking him on either side, on massive video walls. Not to worry -Paul Bielatowicz and Simon Fitzpatrick will still be there for the non-video parts of the show (I just hope they're salaried and not pro-rated on a "persong" basis....). At the moment, the only tour dates that have been announced are in November and beginning of December, but I'm guessing that if this venture is successful there could be other dates and places either planned or added. That's not inside info - it's just a guess. I bring all this up because we in committee feel that what we do is meant to enhance Carl Palmer's ELP legacy, not replace it or detract from it. We want you to get your ELP fix any and every way you possibly can. As a tie-in to Manticore happenings, here's a quick story: My (Rob's) friend Nigel Hewitson, of the UK, was originally (pre-pandemic) planning on coming to the US for a Manticore show. That idea got close to happening, but never panned out. Now (sort-of-post-pandemic), he's planning on coming to New York with his lovely wife, Tracy, to catch one of Carl's video-enhanced shows at the Patchogue Theater. They will be staying with us in Lynbrook, and since there's no Manticore show scheduled for the scant time they'll be here (they'll get to experience a real American Thanksgiving dinner for the very first time), Manticore will be bringing a show to them by having a run-thru rehearsal here in The Lair

while they're visiting! So the Hewitsons will have their own personal continue performance, thus fulfilling all the requirements needed for a perfect, successful vacation - private concert, public concert and huge Thanksgiving dinner that couldn't be beat (thanks, Arlo - yes, we can't have a true Thanksgiving dinner without playing Alice's Restaurant, can we?). Also remember, tickets to <a href="Progon the Ranch 2023">Progon the Ranch 2023</a> are now up for sale on their website. The <a href="Crimson Sky Ranch">Crimson Sky Ranch</a> is much warmer in February than New York (so I'm told) - and we'll be there delivering extra warmth with some of the hottest ELP you've seen in years, along with special guests: Rachel Flowers and Paul Bielatowicz. Other bands headlining will be Awaken (Yes tribute), Great Wide Nothing, Orpheus 9, Local 518 (featuring David Pastorius), Rachel Flowers and Paul Bielatowicz (of Carl Palmer's Legacy Band). ALSO performing that same weekend, will be the following groups: Van Hranicky (Van Halen tribute), Starless (John Wetton tribute), Lambtrot (Genesis tribute), The Very Nice (Nice tribute), Boris & the Spiders (Who tribute), Maynard's Tool (Tool tribute), The Logical Band (Supertramp tribute) and assorted musicians playing their favorite songs on The Grid. It will be a total music weekend that will be well-worth the trip!
